I had heard a lot of good things about Erskine so decided that would be the place for me to live out my final years, luckily for me they had a spare bed for this old sea dog!



I have good days and bad days, since I lost my lovely wife Cathie back in 2021 things have never really been the same, but my family are regular visitors and we have splendid gardens here to enjoy. There are also a range of indoor activities and trips out! We recently went to the Edinburgh Military Tattoo which was great.

My favourite part of the role is getting to know our donors and allowing them to see the life changing impact of their support.





## Home Support EXPANDING OUR REACH

On the 28th June, Armed Forces Day, we proudly launched the expanded Veterans Home Support service, bringing vital in-home assistance to former servicemen and women across the West of Scotland. This £330.000 programme builds on the success of the pilot in Renfrewshire and Inverclyde, which achieved 100% satisfaction among participants.

The programme will deliver companionship to Veterans within a 15-mile radius of the Erskine Veterans Village in Bishopton including East Dunbartonshire, West Dunbartonshire, Inverclyde and Glasgow - the service can extend further based on need. While around 3,000 elderly Veterans currently live within existing catchment areas, up to 50,000 across Scotland could benefit from this holistic support.



This expansion represents just the first step in Erskine's ambitious vision. With your support we plan to continue extending the programme across Scotland, ensuring every Veteran can access the support they need to thrive, regardless of location, income or background.

## 400 VETERANS'LIVES CHANGED...AND COUNTING

"Now, I wake up knowing the pebt men aren't Going to come."

Price hikes in recent years have made it even more difficult for Veterans to survive nevermind thrive.

The doors may have opened in December 2024 but Forres locals were delighted to attend the offical opening of EVAC North in April.

The sun shone as the ribbon-cutting ceremony was eagerly watched on by Veterans, supporters and other members of the local community. Doing the honours was Scott Meenagh - Paratroop Regiment Veteran, GB Paralympian and Erskine Ambassador - who was joined by RAF Veterans Stevie Gray and Fiona Robinson, alongside Erskine CEO Ian Cumming, Chairman Stuart Aitkenhead and RAF Lossiemouth's Wing Commander, Jim Henderson.

EVAC North offers a safe space for likeminded Veterans to come together. Over 400 have sought out the centre where they can take part in art therapy classes, model making, and have a friendly game of pool or darts. In the gym, they can improve their mobility and fitness levels, and of course their mental wellbeing. They can relax with a massage, join the Knit 'N' Natter group or the recently formed rock band, and even get a free haircut from a generous local barber. Importantly, Veterans can talk to each other and find comfort in their shared experiences. They can access specialist support from our on-site counsellor, and our One-Stop-Shop service.

Stevie Gray is one of six committee members helping to develop and shape the Centre "From the very first day it was apparent that the members came first. The influence we had was apparent - the consideration that has been shown to us has been not only outstanding but overwhelming to be honest. Before the Centre I hardly got out. My wife works and is out all day and my daughters are grown up. I was starting to feel isolated to be honest, even though I have a great bunch of friends around me. I am at the Centre so often now that my wife calls herself an 'Erskine Widow' - seriously though, she is delighted that I am happier."

Let us tell you more about the One-Stop-Shop.

The One-Stop-Shop service has provided crucial financial and welfare support to Veterans facing significant financial challenges. The service addresses a critical gap, helping Veterans who are unaware of their entitlements, too proud to seek help, or overwhelmed by complex application processes.

Since starting up in 2021, we have been humbled at the number of Veterans whose lives could have been vastly different had they been given this vital information and support when they initially left the services. Approximately 20 Veterans a month use the service, with most of the 439 Veterans supported by EVAC West (formally ERMAC) accessing this tailored financial advocacy. To date, our Financial Officer has enabled Veterans to access over £470,000 of financial support at EVAC West.

The success of the service at EVAC West meant it was seen as a crucial element of our second Activity Centre, EVAC North, One Veteran discovered he had been receiving a pension of just £150 a week for 15 years when he is rightly entitled to over £1,000 monthly, plus back-dated payments.

Sadly, none of our Veterans' situations are unique. Health and social care services are tremendously stretched, and at breaking point in some areas. People experiencing financial and other difficulties like this can be living completely under the radar. But our Veterans know they are valued – that somebody cares – and that their future will be different. The One-Stop-Shop Service is a lifeline that the Veterans we support cannot afford to be without.

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## VE and VJ Day

#### Supporter Memories

The 8th May and 15th August 1945 - two dates that changed the world forever. History isn't just about dates and events however - it's about real people, real families, and real communities experiencing these extraordinary moments together.

When we asked our supporters to share their VE Day memories, the response was remarkable. From first-hand accounts of the moment families heard the news on the wireless, to treasured wartime recipes that stretched rations into celebration meals, your personal stories bring the past to life in ways that school textbooks never could.

These precious memories remind us that behind every historical milestone are ordinary people whose resilience and community spirit shaped our world.



Here is a small selection of your memories and ration recipes:

"I landed in Glasgow on a boat on VE Day. The boat was full of soldiers and 5 families. We drove through the deserted streets at 6am to my grandparents flat."

"My dad, Henry Gourly, was born in 1920 in Glasgow. He was a volunteer in 1939 and served in the RAF throughout the war years. He and my mum were married in 1941 and he always said he fought for my mum and the freedom of the country so that they could raise a family in peace."

"My mums memory of VE Day street parties and flags. Lots of singing and dancing in George Square removing the baffle walls. She once ran into one in the street in the dark, she was 10."

"I remember a street party complete with piano and people singing and dancing. Very vaguely as I was just 5."

"My uncle, my fathers twin brother, was Sqt Navigator in the RAF. He was shot down during the war at age 21. Had my uncle survived he would have retired somewhere like the Erskine Hospital to rehabilitate. Over the years I have always supported and admired the wonderful job vou do for the survivors."

"Born 1950! My mother (who passed away in Erskine) was operating the teleprinter in Washington DC. on the British staff, overnight and on VE Day."

"VE Night is my very first memory. I was 3 and a half years old, we lived in Springburn and everyone was out celebrating. letting off fireworks and dancing just outside. My brothers were fast asleep, my mother carried me downstairs and I vividly remember all the men greeting my mother in a very respectful way. I later questioned her about it - why? It was that night she found out that my daddy had died for us. My father, Flying Officer JB Marshall, is buried in Germany and we visit regularly."

"In May 1945 my father was still engaged in jungle warfare in Burma, so his family celebrations would have been muted. Please make sure that VJ Day is also remembered. The surrender of Japan took place the day before my fathers 20th birthday."





"This is one of my grandmothers recipes using liquid paraffin! Circa 1942

Sponge: 1 tbs dried egg. 1 tbs sugar, 3 tbs self raising flour, 1 tsp baking powder, pinch of salt, 2 tbs liquid paraffin, milk

Sieve dry ingredients and mix well, add paraffin and enough milk to make a smooth soft "sponge" mixture, place into greased and lined 8" tin. Bake for 15-20min in moderate oven (160)

My uncle called it "LaVe" sponge as it was alleged to making one dash to the loo!"

"Aunt Rita's Cake 2oz margarine (melt in pan), 2 cups self raising flour, 1 cup currants, 1 cup sugar, 1 egg beaten in a cup of milk.

Mix together and bake 1 hour at No 4. middle shelf in a cake tin"

"I recall Woolton Pie. It was a vegetable pie made predominately of tomato and named after the Minister of Food, Lord Woolton. As country dwellers a major component of our meat consumption was fresh rabbit."

## Preserving History

#### EVAC West Veterans' Memories

As the number of surviving World War Two Veterans falls, members of EVAC West have undertaken a remarkable mission to ensure their stories live on. Working alongside Park Mains High School pupils, they've created "My Life Through WW2" — a powerful book capturing first-hand experiences from one of history's most challenging periods.

This intergenerational project, supported by The National Lottery Heritage Fund Scotland, has preserved memories spanning from the Arctic Convoys and Clydebank Blitz to evacuation, rationing, and rebuilding lives after the war. Led by Jennifer McKeeman, with support from volunteer Caitlin Rose McGuire, the year long initiative gave Veterans the opportunity to document their experiences in their own words while offering young people direct access to living history.

Erskine CEO, Ian Cumming MBE, emphasises the project's significance: "This is a beautiful example of what can happen when generations come together with curiosity and respect. Our Veterans have lived through extraordinary times.

Giving them the chance to tell their stories ensures that history is not just remembered but understood by generations to come."

EVAC West Deputy Manager Evonne McCord found personal meaning in the project: "Hearing the memories of our Veterans gave me a deeper understanding of what my own parents might have experienced. I'm certain that many who read this book will reflect on their own family histories and find a personal connection in these pages."

Captain Bryan Warren, a proud Argyll and Sutherland Highlander and long-time ERMAC member, was born in 1938. Bryan's wartime memories begin with evacuation to Bournemouth as a young boy and vivid recollections of D-Day aircraft overhead.

His story highlights how small moments of kindness can resonate across decades: "The war took so much from so many, but it also taught us the value of small kindnesses. I'll never forget the sailor who gave me a bar of chocolate as a boy. It may seem small, but that moment stayed with me for life."

Bryan's lifetime of service included mentoring young cadets and fundraising for fellow Veterans. "I've always believed in paying that kindness forward," he explains. "This project is another way of doing that — making sure our stories aren't lost and that the next generation carries them forward with respect and understanding."





For 99-year-old Albert Lamond, a D-Day Veteran and Erskine resident, the project serves a vital purpose. "It's vital we teach the younger ones the true cost of freedom," he says. "We won't be here forever, but these stories - our memories - must live on."

Albert was just 18 when he joined HMS Rowley, playing a crucial role in some of the war's most dangerous naval operations. During the D-Day landings, his ship protected HMS Warspite as it shelled German positions along the Normandy coast. His role was to spot and signal threats – a responsibility that carried enormous weight.

"If this book helps just one young person understand what we went through – what it cost – then it's worth it," Albert reflects. "We fought so they wouldn't have to. That's what matters."

The book features personal reflections from Veterans alongside restored photographs and original illustrations. It will be distributed to participating Veterans, with educational packs available to local schools across Renfrewshire.



Armed Forces Week (23rd-29th June) proved to be an exceptional celebration for our Veterans, highlighted by our special invitation to the official opening of the Janet Harvey Hall at BAE Systems.

This remarkable new facility represents cutting-edge maritime engineering - capable of housing two frigates side-by-side and featuring an extremely large Giga door, allowing ships to be seamlessly moved in and out during construction.

Our EVAC West members embraced the 1940s-themed celebration while discovering the impressive scale and craftsmanship behind this state-of-the-art "shed." We were truly amazed by the sheer size and sophistication of this facility, designed to protect the skilled workforce from Scotland's challenging weather conditions.

The invitation reflects the enduring partnership between Erskine and the Clyde shipbuilding community - a connection that continues to strengthen as we support those who have served our nation.

It was wonderful to see our Veterans engage with this living piece of maritime history while celebrating Armed Forces Week in such a meaningful setting.

This historic partnership spans over a century. from Yarrow shipbuilders supporting injured sailors and soldiers in WWI at Erskine Hospital to celebrating today's naval achievements with BAE Systems.

Research shows that interaction with animals can reduce feelings of isolation and anxiety among older people. By bringing people and animals together, we are creating moments of connection and calm that can make a lasting difference.
